

TERRITORY WOMEN'S CONFERENCE

Saturday 1 June saw the birth of an exciting event that has been in the planning for two years by the committee of the NT Baptist Women's Ministry under the leadership of **Pastor Toni Rehrmann**. Their vision is for women around the Territory to be empowered and built up through inspired worship and Bible based teaching and also to become more involved in advocacy and justice for other women.

Over 160 women came from all over the Northern Territory to participate in the inaugural Territory Women's Conference, **TOGETHER, Rise Up**, held at Darwin Baptist Church. And they were not disappointed! This exciting event proved to be all that was promised, bringing inspiration and blessing to many.

Sue Peters of Queensland, the National Director of Australian Baptist Women, was the key speaker. Her passion to see women embrace the freedom, healing and grace that is found in God was reflected in her message - along with a good dose of humour!

Davina Avery of Casuarina Baptist, gave a moving presentation about her challenging walk with Dissociative Identity Disorder, depression and anxiety resulting from severe childhood abuse. Her passionate love of the Lord and complete surrender to Him shows the miracle of God's healing touch.

Those present were touched and challenged by the Freeset story, a Fairtrade, non-for-profit business in Kolkota, India, that works to bring women out of the sex trade - freeing them to a life of dignity and hope. Freeset also works in rural India to prevent trafficking of young girls into prostitution. Conference women responded from their hearts by sponsoring children through Baptist World Aid and through donating to Freeset with \$4,000 raised at the Conference.



Reconciliation at Cross Roads



One of the most significant events in the life of Cross Roads took place on the last weekend in February with the repentance, forgiveness, healing and reconciliation between the Church and previous Pastors, Paul and Anne Downie.


A little over ten years ago, Paul and Anne pastored what was then Palmerston Baptist Church for around 9 months. Early this year it was brought to Bruce's attention that, all those years ago and in the midst of difficulty, two warnings received from the Lord went unheeded. Others chose a course of action which, sadly, placed Paul and Anne in a difficult situation, with very little option but to resign.

It was immediately obvious that "something" needed to be done. Following discussion with the Elders, Bruce rang Paul to ask if both he and Anne would travel to Palmerston and join in a time of reconciliation - with all expenses paid by Cross Roads. Paul's immediate response was: "...(we) were just talking about that last week and wondering how it could be healed".

Paul and Anne arrived in Darwin on Friday 22 February. A series of meetings and discussions took place on Friday and throughout much of Saturday.

In the Sunday morning service, following the worship, with the Elders and their wives at the front, Bruce apologised to Paul and Anne on behalf of the church and "...those who have gone before...", asking for forgiveness and saying "Sorry". There was also repentance and asking God for forgiveness. Paul and Anne both gave their forgiveness and then apologised to the church, asking forgiveness for not staying.

As part of the “ceremony” and in response to one of the warnings from Revelation 2, a candle was lit as a prophetic symbol of the “lampstand being restored”. Paul and Anne served communion to Bruce and Sue, who then served the Elders. At that point everyone else was invited to come forward to share communion – amidst hugs and tears. Following communion, Paul went on to preach and lead the rest of the service.



The observation was later made: “That service was the most challenging, moving, and powerful time of reconciliation and healing that I have ever seen.” Since then, there has been quite a change in the ‘atmosphere’ at Cross Roads with a real sense of “...the end of one chapter and the beginning of a new...”

To Paul and Anne who were prepared to make the time available, to travel to Palmerston and who were so willing to come face-to-face with, and work through, some incredibly painful and difficult memories and experiences, we say, *“Your courage and commitment are examples to us all. Thankyou.”*

Lajamanu Christians Get Creative

Early morning devotions on Monday, Wednesday and Friday have been inspirational for us all. These mornings at 6 am we meet at a different home with a different person leading the devotion. It has been so encouraging to start the day with our brothers and sisters in Christ reading the Bible together, listening and praying.

What a wet Easter!! We attended Easter in Katherine hosted by Katherine Warlpiri Church. We appreciated camping at Morrow's farm. Friday church service, sing-alongs and sharing times were encouraging to all who attended.

Katherine Baptist at the Markets



Katherine Baptist Church held a stall at the local market on 27 April to raise funds for the Birthing Kit Foundation (Australia) which is an organisation dedicated to improving the conditions for women who give birth at home in developing countries. They state that “every 90 seconds, a woman dies of complications related to pregnancy and childbirth. With an estimated 385,000 women dying annually in childbirth, many from

infections acquired during childbirth, there is a great need for our clean birthing kits”.

At the Katherine markets our ladies sold lots of produce, including gift cards, jewelry, fridge magnets, knitted toys, pot plants, cakes and slices, all handmade/cooked by the women in the church. We raised a fantastic \$440 on the day, bringing our total fundraising efforts to over the \$1200 we needed to make up 400 birthing kits.


We are looking forward to our Assembly Day on Saturday 25 May (which would have already happened by the time you get this news!) when we will put together 400 kits to be sent overseas to wherever there is the greatest need. Each kit contains: a plastic sheet, gloves, soap, blade, string and gauze. We have also been given a generous donation of \$450 from the midwives at the Katherine Hospital, to be passed on to the Foundation .

Overall, we have had lots of fun working together to raise these funds and are thrilled to be able to help this worthwhile cause.

Baptists Welcome Royal Commission on Child Abuse

Australian Baptist Ministries has welcomed the announcement by Prime Minister Julia Gillard of a Royal Commission into child abuse and institutional response. "Abuse of any kind is incompatible with Christian mission and Christian community. Where abuse is alleged to have occurred, information should be treated seriously and addressed through established protocols," ABM National Ministries Director, the Rev. Keith Jobberns, said. "We intend to participate fully with the Royal Commission to uncover the truth and develop a stronger culture of transparency and accountability for all.

Australian Baptist Ministries has in place a national response to known offenders, and Baptist associations in each State have established protocols to deal with allegations of child abuse," Rev. Jobberns said. "The wellbeing of children must always be a first priority for families, churches and other institutions. We pray for those who have been hurt and betrayed by those entrusted to their care, and commit ourselves to work to ensure a safer and more just society for all," he said.



Conversation with John

Our BUNT President, Rev. John Baynes, came to the Territory 11 years ago with his wife, Carmen, to work with the Warlpiri people in Katherine. Since then they have also nurtured the small communities at Pigeon Hole and Knuckeyes Lagoon and seen many baptised and become followers of Jesus. They have also witnessed the emergence of Church Leaders in each place.

John, where did you grow up and what was it like?

In a little old place in Florida, USA called DeSoto County. We lived way back in the woods and gathered all our food straight from the earth. We caught brim on fish hooks made from safety pins. I didn't wear shoes till I went to High School. We spoke Creole; I couldn't even talk proper English till I went through High School. My Father was Jamaican and my Mother African-American but it was my Grandma (we called her 'Grandmapa') who brought up me and my brother Joey. All my boyhood I was called Larry Barry. It wasn't till I joined the Marines that I found out my real name was John Baynes!

What led you to a career in the Marines?

In my last year of High School all branches of the Defence Force conducted tests for interested students. To my surprise I passed the test and chose the Marines because I liked the uniform! After Boot Camp in 1968 I went to Okinawa, Japan then to Vietnam for 18 months during that war. I was stationed in various places in USA, Japan and North Korea. In 1990 I was in the first Gulf War in Iraq then I retired after 22 years. I really came to know Christ when I was in Okinawa.

Who was the most influential person in your life?

A lady at my home church called Doris Robinson, also an African American, was the person who most influenced my life. She became my mentor but more than that, she was the Mum I never had. I called her 'Mum'. Mum Doris encouraged me, chastised me, loved me, prayed for me and pushed me. She taught me what it means to follow Jesus. That's when I decided to go to Golden Gates Theological Seminary (Bible College) for 4 years. She encouraged and helped me through my Bible training. She was there all the way for me right up till last year when she went to be with Jesus. She even visited us twice in the Northern Territory.



John, have you ever experienced racism or prejudice?

All the time when I was growing up. I didn't have friends mostly because I was poor, raggedy and black; people treated me badly. Many times I had to run and hide from white fellas on horses who were out to kill and hang. But something inside me stopped me from getting angry. I was determined that bad people would not make me angry. Even now it doesn't matter what hurtful things people say or if they get upset I won't retaliate. I believe God used those experiences to make me strong and so I would treat all people the same. God loves everyone equally whatever race or colour.

What has God been teaching you since you came to the Northern Territory?

To Listen! Listen to God and listen to the people who I am called to serve. I try to do what God tells me to and not what man says. At the same time I need to respect and hear the voice of my colleagues and the people I work with. I have learn a lot from my Christian colleagues here.

What is your favourite Bible verse?

“I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me” (Phil: 4:13)

Without Him I could not do anything.

Resolving Every Day Conflict

We are in the midst of an 8 week series where the message each Sunday introduces the topic that will be discussed in connect groups that week. We are also taught during this series how conflict can be a very healthy thing and provide an opportunity for growth as a person and as a Christian.

So what is it about? Well it is about dealing with conflict in our lives which could be at home, at work, in the church; it could be something big, but often it is the small things that get in the way of healthy relationships. The Sunday messages are clear and to the point and the Connect groups use a DVD where the study is presented with questions for discussion at the end. I know in the group that I attend that there has been a lot gained through what we are learning together.

In a nutshell how does this work? I suppose the easiest way is to say that it is all Biblically based. The series draws out how Jesus dealt with conflict, both personally and how he taught through parables or in the way he answered people's questions.

I know from speaking with Pastor Mal Sercombe that this series made a big difference to people's lives at Darwin Baptist when they did it and I can see how it can make a difference for the people here at Casuarina Baptist as they start to apply the skills taught in this series.

I highly commend this series and encourage others to use this in their church setting.
