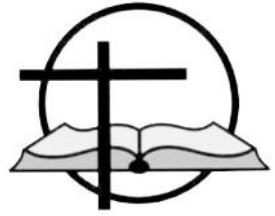

President's Message



Does anyone have a snorkel?

There is an ancient story that tells the account of the tribes of Israel, as they gathered along the shoreline of the Red Sea. Having fled Egypt, the leaders met by the water's edge arguing with one another about who would go into the water first. There was no decision made and the level of anxiety and fear grew. Eventually Nashon, son of Amminidab, stood up and began to walk into the water.

He walked into the water up to his knees, but the water did not part; then up to his waist, but the water did not part. Up to his shoulders, then up to his chin, but the water did not part. Finally, he took the step that would have seen his nose go under the water, and it was then, that the water parted.

Nashon simply remembered why they were there, along with the promise that had brought them to this point.

The writer, Gil Rendle, tells this story because he believes that this is where the church is placed at this particular time in history.

Significant changes have taken place and 'there is no going back because the "back" that is remembered doesn't exist anymore'. And what lays before us is an uncharted wilderness. But the people of God have been in the wilderness before. Gil states that 'the wilderness changes people for God's purpose.... but the wilderness is a curious place for leaders to lead. By definition, one must lead without being sure where one is going.' What is called for, is a people belonging to God who are open to 'discernment, discovery, and surprise', and what is called for in a leader is 'quiet courage'.

May we all remember why we are here, along with the promise that has brought us to this point. Then, with a quiet courage, trust our LORD and Saviour as he leads us in the wilderness, by his Spirit.

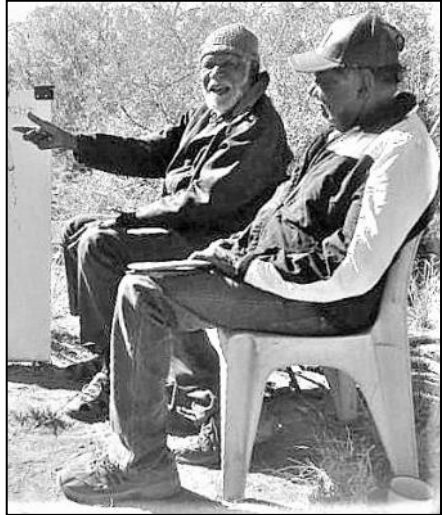

“My body is not doing too well, but it is well with my soul”



It was with great sadness that Darwin Baptist Church said bye to our brother and dear friend, Graham (Gra) Drake, in July. Gra was much loved and well known for his strong Christian faith and heart for the poor and vulnerable. We are so thankful for his gospel witness and the fellowship we shared with him.

Gra grew up in Melbourne, Victoria. He attended Haileybury school, where Rev. Frank Elmore

encouraged Gra to know, live and worship God and do good to others, a teaching that stayed with Gra all his life. He came to faith in his teen years, encouraged by this grandparents' example.

Gra met Di through ballroom dancing when he was 20 years old. They became engaged after six weeks, married after six months and spent more than 50 years together.

As well as blessing the couple with three wonderful children, God gave them a deep love for the poor and marginalised. They spent many of their early married years opening their home to children who were wards of the state, living on the street or had been released from juvenile detention.

Gra and Di even opened a coffee shop for street children – a ministry that soon expanded from serving coffee, to bible studies and prayer meetings – while Gra sold the family car and bought an old transit van to collect children for fellowship and study nights. Eventually he and Di become the operators of Montrose House, a crisis care facility in Victoria.

After they moved to the NT, Di and Gra – a teacher and social worker by trade – became involved in outreach at various organisations including Julalikari Council Aboriginal Corporation and Baptist Care NT’s Food for Life.

“Dad taught us how to live,” said Adam, Gra’s son. “He taught us that it’s our job to be out in the community loving others. We are Christians through our actions, not just through our words.

“Dad put on my heart to go out and get busy, so I reckon he would want you to do the same. Whatever your backyard is, go and get your hands dirty and live for Christ, just as Dad did.”

Hear Us, See Us with our Karen Community

On Saturday, 19 June, a Refugee Week event was held at the **Casuarina Baptist Church**, raising awareness of the issues affecting our Karen refugees (from Burma / Myanmar) and to help the broader community understand what it is like to be a refugee.

This was especially meaningful, as it followed closely after the military coup in Myanmar on 1 February 2021, which ousted the lawfully elected government and brought in a military junta, bringing terror and trauma to all of Myanmar's people.



The Covid pandemic is also running rife in Myanmar with many deaths due to the scarcity and expense of vaccines. Most Karen families here have lost loved ones back home to the Covid virus.

On this special afternoon the Karen folk shared cultural performances, music and wonderful food with the audience. A carefully scripted presentation, by several Karen people, revealed different aspects of their former life –

The Karen village before fleeing to life in the Jungles for hiding and refuge from the attacks of the Burmese Army. Then life, often for decades, in the Refugee Camps on the Thai/Burma border and finally the challenges of navigating resettlement in Australia.

The Karen are indigenous people whose traditional homeland partly borders Thailand. For generations, they have been persecuted because of their ethnicity and religion. Most Karen are Christians.

The Karen people resettled in Australia, have come as refugees under the UN Humanitarian Refugee program. About 15 Karen families live in Darwin now, consisting of about 50 people. They are a close knit community, holding onto their culture while growing into the Australian way of life. Some of their young adults are studying at a tertiary level and others serve in the Australian Defence Force. Horticulture, health care, education, commercial cleaning and the primary industry sector are other work environments.

Casuarina Baptist Church is the spiritual home for many Karen. They participate in the regular Sunday worship service and other church ministries. Their own service in the Karen language is at 12:30pm on Sunday. Casuarina Church is truly blessed to have the Karen as friends and fellow worshippers.

The NT Karen Community is grateful to the CBC leadership and the church family, for its strong and generous support and encouragement across 14 years of pastoral care, friendships and through the ministries of Casuarina Baptist Church.

Baptist World Aid's 2021

Ethical Fashion Report

Baptist World Aid's 2021 Ethical Fashion Report finds lingering gaps in wages and sustainability.

Fashion companies are investing more than ever in ethical sourcing, but their efforts still aren't reaching garment workers, according to the 2021 Ethical Fashion Report launched by Baptist World Aid Australia this month. The Christian development organisation has released its latest fashion scorecard for close to 100 Australian fashion companies representing 428 brands, including its first new A+ to F grades in over two years.

Twenty companies received an A+ or A, 55 received a B or C and 23 received a D or F this year.

"Consumers have influenced hugely positive progress in encouraging the fashion industry to become more ethical and sustainable," said **Peter Keegan, Baptist World Aid's Director of Advocacy.** "But these scores show us we're not there yet."

Forty percent of companies improved their score in 2021 compared to 2019, with positive shifts in supply chain tracing and transparency and use of more sustainable fabrics.



Because Baptist World Aid is committed to caring for the world's most vulnerable, this year's report is troubling due to the industry's lack of progress in initiatives to empower garment workers. The average company scored a D for their actions on wage improvement, worker unions and complaints processes.

The number of companies paying some workers in their supply chain a living wage dropped from 20 percent in 2019 to 15 per cent in 2021, a decline attributed to the economic impacts of the COVID crisis. Consequently, garment workers in countries where Baptist World Aid works like Bangladesh lost more than US\$16 billion dollars in wages.



In addition to the pandemic, the report reflects the industry's need to reduce its impact on climate change. Though the number of companies with a commitment to reduce emissions has risen by 10 percent since 2019, the total with a climate strategy is still less than half of those assessed in 2021.

Also new this year is an explanation of how a company's score out of 100 aligns to the familiar A+ to F grades, with the average company scoring 33.6. Keegan says this shows that although the industry is moving in the right direction, it still has a long way to go.

'We want to encourage people to continue to choose more ethical brands to buy from,' he said. 'And to keep encouraging their favourite brands to do better for garment workers.'

Old fashioned generosity in a new cashless age

Do you remember Mum or Dad passing you some coins to put in the plate? If you pass the basket around the congregation these days, you may well find it's a little light. It's not that people are less generous, but they are less likely to carry cash and maybe that's a good thing for the church.

As Solomon said, there is nothing new under the sun. Christians have always been called to generously provide financially for the ministry, mission and mercies of the Church.

Remember this:

Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

2 Corinthians 9:6-8

This isn't really new; people have been giving online for a while now. With everything from home loan payments to Pay TV subscriptions coming out of our accounts regularly, it's the new normal.

Whereas people might have once been in the habit of deciding on Sunday morning what they should give, online giving requires a more thoughtful approach – and perhaps a more generous one as a result.

However, it can be confronting for churches to know how to handle this revolution in giving. Short of publicising account details, how do you encourage faithfulness in giving? Or clarify the difference between regular giving and special fundraising drives?

Baptist Financial Services has recently revamped a product called **Giveway** to answer this need. We understand that churches do not want or need to make things more complicated for their congregations. **Giveway** has been designed to make it secure, simple and painless for people to give regularly online, without high fees. There are benefits to the church team too, as there is no need to count or deposit cash, and the risk of cash being stolen is eliminated. Reporting is built into normal Campaigns to make life easy for the Treasurer.

Giveway can even produce Tax Receipts for deductible campaigns, ready for when July rolls around.

Yes, it's different to pulling out the wallet on Sunday and peeling off a few notes, but the new generations can pull out their phone and click on a QR code instead. It's no less generous, and is still drawn from a heart that loves Jesus. And just maybe it's actually better. See more at www.giveway.org.au


